The Vicar writes....

In times when nothing stood But worsened, or grew strange, There was one constant good: She did not change.

Words from the English poet and librarian from Hull, Philip Larkin, in the year of her Late Majesty's Silver Jubilee (1977).

September 8<sup>th</sup> brought news of her Majesty's death; we all knew that the day would one day come, but when it did the shock was no less felt. Looking for an image of her Majesty on the palace website, I was suddenly faced with a black computer screen and the announcement of her death. For a moment time just stood still. And so September has been a month when sadness and grief has entered hearts and minds on a collective scale. A ten day period of national mourning impacted us all. The multiple divisions and challenges facing the country were set to one side to allow for a united honouring of the incredible service and utter dedication given over so many years by her late Majesty. When many 'talk the talk' of public service, she has 'walked' the walk.'

Philip Larkin captured someone very powerful in the final line of his poem: 'she did not change.' Of course, the Queen changed, historians can tell the story of how the monarchy evolved over the 70 years of her reign, but Elizabeth II Queen of our country remained at the heart of our national life. Sir Keir Starmer speaking in parliament captured something very true: 'her death robs this country of its stillest point, its greatest comfort, at precisely the time we need those things most.'

'To all of us as a family, as to this kingdom and the wider family of nations of which it is a part, my mother gave an example of lifelong love and of selfless service.'

My mother's reign was unequalled in its duration, its dedication and its devotion. Even as we grieve, we give thanks for this most faithful life.

(King Charles III)

The grief of this day – felt not only by the late Queen's family but all round the nation, Commonwealth and the world – arises from her abundant life and loving service, now gone from us.

(Archbishop Justin Welby)

Personally, I have known nothing other than the Queen as monarch. She has always been there. In the midst of the economic challenges facing our nation, the political instability at home and in Europe, global concerns about the environment, and with covid's legacy still keenly felt, then perhaps we hoped for some things to stay constant. I guess life rarely gives us that luxury.

But when one monarch dies then another is swiftly proclaimed, bringing hope and the possibility for something new. Charles III will inhabit the role in his own way, allowing for continuity and also bringing change. I loved a little cartoon that I came across which featured a Corgi and a King Charles cavalier spaniel stood outside Buckingham palace. The following words were placed into the confident and smug looking cavalier's mouth: 'You're history, pal- make way for the King Charles spaniel.' (I've got one I can loan for royal duties!).

King Charles, rooted in his own faith and devotion to Christian practice, will take on the role of 'Defender of the Faith and supreme governor of the Church of England' as his mother did. Like her late Majesty, King Charles understands the importance of the state church providing a space for people of all faiths to practice their faith in freedom and to be heard, respected and valued in their contributions to national life. King Charles especially needs our prayers as he begins his role as Monarch of the United Kingdom, Head of the Commonwealth of Nations and takes his place with other monarchs, presidents and leaders on the world's stage.

His Proclamation speech contained heartfelt words of trust in God's grace and help. 'And in carrying out the heavy task that has been laid upon me, and to which I now dedicate what remains to me of my life, I pray for the guidance and help of Almighty God'.

May we respond in the same spirit that St Paul writes to Timothy ... 'First of all, then, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings should be made for everyone, <sup>2</sup> for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity. <sup>3</sup> This is right and is acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour, <sup>4</sup> who desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.'

It was a formidable and difficult session as ringer's arms were beginning to ache and much concentration was required. Canon June joined us in the ringing room to provide welcome support, however we did not allow her to escape without joining in! I am pleased to report that Canon June "chimed" the last five minutes of the hour.

We have all been challenged in so many different ways, all the ringers have enhanced their tolling skills, some have used them for the first time. We have all had the opportunity to ring fully muffled bells which is not something that every ringer can achieve. Our tower captain Adrian has been in and out of the bell chamber several times putting muffles on and off, this is most definitely not a job for the faint hearted! Whilst our half muffles are professionally manufactured, the full muffles were a "Heath Robinson" affair. This is due to the fact that most towers do not possess a set of full muffles due to the rare occasions when they are required.

Throughout this rather unusual schedule of ringing we have all been challenged in so many different ways. However, we have worked as a team to practice that most ancient of arts, the ringing of church bells.





#### GOD SAVE THE KING

On Thursday 8th September 2022 the many people who were gathered outside Buckingham Palace sang, 'God Save the King" for the new King Charles III. These words were unfamiliar, having not been sung for a sovereign within our shores since 1952, when they were last sung for King George VI. Many of you, like me, will never have sung this latest version with the word'King' in it.

The author of the anthem is unknown. It has been suggested that it may originate in plainchant. Sometimes an attribution to John Bull is made, although several other candidates have been mentioned.

God Save the King was first performed in London in 1745 and became known as the national anthem at the start of the 19th century. In September 1745, when news of the battle of Prestonpans, near Edinburgh, reached London, the bandleader at the Theatre Royal, Drury Lane, played an arrangement after the performance which we now recognise as God Save the King. It was so well received that it was repeated every night at the end of the performance. This practice rapidly spread to other theatres and very soon the custom of greeting the monarch with this song was established.

Within the United Kingdom the first verse is often sung alone, even on some official occasions. Our national anthem is not enshrined in law, so its words may be changed, as they were on the 8th September when the word 'Queen' was changed to 'King'.

God save our gracious King, Long live our noble King, God save the King, Send him victorious, Happy and glorious, Long to reign over us, God save the King.




